Self-imposed management by rules with no legal penalty


Contents of a self-imposed rule in Minami-jima Island

Rules about	Contents
Walking	Tourists must keep to the trails
Maximum time on trails	2 hours
Maximum number of tourists on trails per day	100 people
Maximum numbers of tourists per group	15 people
Additional restriction	Tourists are prohibited to land on the island in 3 months of the year









Host (Supply) dimension
